



Adam Shoalts is known as one of Canada's greatest living explorers. His career has included mapping unchartered rivers, leading expeditions sponsored by the Royal Canadian Geographical Society and Mountain Equipment Co-op, numerous archaeological digs, photographing elusive and rare wildlife, and completing a nearly 4,000 km solo journey across Canada's Arctic.

Shoalts is the author of articles on edible mushrooms, deforestation, and watershed pollution in northern Canada. His first book, *Alone Against the North*, is a #1 national best-seller. In 2013, Shoalts was elected a Fellow of the Royal Canadian Geographical Society for his extraordinary contributions to geography. His latest book, *A History of Canada in Ten Maps* has been longlisted for the 2018 RBC Taylor Prize, and shortlisted for the 2018 Louise de Kiriline Lawrence Award for Nonfiction.

Through "The Letter Writing Project" we will connect communities in Waterloo Region with those in South Algonquin through collaboration between Button Factory Arts and South Algonquin Library. Once a month for six months we will meet to write letters and create art to send to our pen pals. Through this project you will have the opportunity to be connected with a pen pal with whom you'll write back and forth. Physical letter writing will also allow the integration of artwork using mixed media materials. Facilitators are excited to regenerate the art of letter writing. All are welcome; come individually, or with family and friends! Youth under 14 should attend with a parent or guardian.

Oct. 24: A little about me, who is sending this letter to you: A point of introduction to the project and to our new-found pen-pals.

**Nov. 14: A portrait from my window:** This session offers participants a chance to tell a more detailed story from our personal history complemented by a project based around watercolour painting.

**Dec. 12: Yesterday from dawn of day to turning out the light:** For the art project this month, we will gather 'ephemera' from our daily lives.

**Jan. 16: A gift to my community, a gift to yours:** Letters about something important or sentimental that we would wish for.

Feb. 13: My favourite object(s): Explored as a 'zine' (small art book).

Mar. 19: Why I will miss you, Pen-Pal: Building time capsules and reflecting on this experience.
